PURPLE HANDS RALLY

EMS is celebrating its 13th annual Purple Hands Rally at 8:30am, Thursday, October 12th in the gym.

This is an anti-bullying /tolerance program in which students, parents, and staff pledge to stop bullying at our school. There will be a play performed by RESPECT2ALL to emphasize how peer pressure and harassment can affect the entire student body. Whether the bully, the victim, or the by-stander, studies have shown that this behavior has negative consequences for all involved. As a school and community we need to teach acceptance of others and the issues they may be dealing with.



RESPECT2ALL is a research-based, nonprofit organization based in Omaha and was founded by child psychologist, Dr. Patricia Newman. In this program, actors interact with the students after the play to educate them on how to identify situations in which they may feel peer pressure and healthy strategies they may use if they feel pressure to engage in unhealthy behaviors. At times, these plays can bring out strong emotions.

Lang Arts – We have learned about the different ways words can work together in sentences. This month, we will continue to focus on subjects and predicates. We will have our sentences district assessment this month. During second quarter, we will be writing paragraphs.

Reading – Sixth grade students are studying the elements of fiction and applying those elements to the novel: Tuck Everlasting by Natalie Babbitt. All students should be reading AR books and taking tests over them when done.

Science – In the beginning of October we will finish up our Science Inquiry Unit. For the rest of the month we will studying the Environment.

Social Studies –Social Studies students will continue studying the United States Government. We will also study our state and local government.

Math – After completing our number theory unit, sixth grade math students will be focusing on ratios and proportions.

In Science, 7th graders will be wrapping up the scientific method and inquire unit. We will then move into Earth Science. In this unit we will study Earth's structure, plate tectonics, earthquakes, and volcanoes. The Student textbook will be online. We will continue to have Friday quizzes over material covered each week.


In Language Arts we will begin second quarter with a writing project. We will be practicing the steps of the writing process and be taking our work from prewriting to publishing. We will also begin our study of the eight parts of speech in mid-October. That will take us through the end of the month.

7th grade Math students will be finishing Chapter 2 and starting Chapter 3. This will start an application of percentages unit.

Pre-Algebra students have begun Chapter 3, which includes simplifying expressions and solving equations using all operations.

In World History we are finishing up with the Fertile Crescent Empires. We have been looking at the ancient areas of Mesopotamia, Sumer, Babylon, and Assyria. In addition, we have been studying the different empires that were established in these areas and how the civilizations and empires were developed. In the next chapter we will be studying Ancient Egypt.

In reading, we will continue with our fiction unit and will begin our mystery novel at the end of the month. First quarter AR goals are due on Monday, October 9.

Our year is off to a fantastic start. We are enjoying your students. We will soon begin preparation for Student-Led Conferences which will be held October 17 & 18.

In Language Arts we are beginning our writing unit. We are focusing on powerful sentence structure, effective paragraphing, specific/precise details, and text-dependent analyses. We are preparing for the district writing assessment which will take place early in November.

In Reading, students are finishing this quarter's theme of comprehension and analysis of fiction, with emphasis upon inferring and drawing conclusions. Students will take the common assessment over fiction in mid-October.

In American History we will be working toward our first common assessment, Duties and Responsibilities of American citizens.

In Science we will finish working on our science inquiry project and then begin studying weathering, erosion, and Earth history.

In Pre-Algebra we will be covering positive and negative exponents, scientific notation, along with divisibility rules. In Algebra we will be writing, solving and graphing (compound) inequalities.

POWER SCHOOL

APPOINTMENT REMINDER

Any student who needs to leave school during the day for an appointment **must check out with the office before leaving**. No student will be dismissed unless the following has occurred:

Parents/guardians have contacted the school office and arranged for the dismissal (by phone or note). You may notify the office up to a week before, but preferably no later than 8:30 am the day of the appointment. The student will be given a pass to leave the classroom, go to their locker, sign out in the office, and meet you at the front door at the requested time. This process allows for minimal disruption to the classroom while allowing you to pick your child up as needed. We appreciate your efforts to schedule appointments outside of school hours when possible.

SchoolMessenger – Are You Up to Date?

EPS uses a parent messaging system called SchoolMessenger to send emails and phone calls to parents. To ensure you are receiving important messages from your school, be sure to let the office know of any changes to your email addresses or phone numbers.

YouTube – A Guide to Understanding Your Child's Video Watching

YouTube is a common video watching platform used by many youths to find content on subjects that they find interesting or enjoyable to watch. In order to have a better understanding of what your child is watching on YouTube, below is a list of questions that you can ask:

What's trending today? Trending videos appear on YouTube's home page and show the most recent viral videos, what's funny, and what's being shared. Knowing what's trending will give parents a better understanding of the type of content your child is being exposed to by them simply going to the YouTube home page.

What channels do you subscribe to? If a child is taking the time to subscribe to a specific channel, it's a guarantee that the content being shown is something of interest to them. Get involved and find out what those channels are, so you can get a better idea of what specific content your child finds interesting and why. This could turn out to be a significant subject area interest for your child and a good common ground topic for conversations.

What's in your library? One's YouTube library is the place where videos that the user has liked or shared are stored. This too, is a way to discover content that your child finds interesting.

What was the last video you shared? Youth share things with others only when they find them to be interesting or enjoyable, or they feel that others will enjoy them as well. Get a glimpse into what videos are catching their attention by asking this question.


