A strong partnership with the community is one of the hallmarks of the Elkhorn Public Schools. To this end, the district publishes an Annual Report to the community to provide an overview of finances, assessment results, progress updates, and more. Most importantly, the Annual Report allows us to showcase the achievements of our students.

The Elkhorn Public Schools serves around 10,000 students; these enrollment numbers increased 6% for the 2019-2020 school year, maintaining the five-year average increase of over 7% annually and marking the 33rd consecutive year of growth for the district.

Elkhorn students' test scores place them among the top statewide and nationally. We are proud of our students and know that no ranking or test score can provide a true picture of the accomplishments that are done each and every day in our classrooms. We celebrate these accomplishments as we prepare for even greater achievements ahead.




State Testing - NSCAS


Annually, students in grades 3-8 take the Nebraska Student-Centered Assessment System (NSCAS) assessments in English Language Arts (ELA) and Math; students in grades 5 and 8 also take NSCAS Science. The ELA and Math tests, formerly known as NeSA, were recently revised to better reflect college and career-ready standards. When the assessments were revised, the cut scores were made more rigorous. The Science assessment is currently in the revision process, and the updated version will be administered in the spring of 2021.

On all NSCAS assessments, students fall into one of three state-determined score categories: Developing, On Track, and College and Career-Ready. The graphs below show the percentage of Elkhorn students meeting or exceeding state standards compared to state averages.





State Testing - 11th Grade ACT



In order to meet state and federal testing requirements, students are required to take the ACT in the spring of their 11th grade year. This requirement gives all students an opportunity to take the ACT at no cost to them and to then use the results earned for college entrance information.

The graphs featured show EPS students' scores, both composite and individual subject areas, in comparison to Nebraska state averages.



National Testing - Graduate ACT

The ACT generates a yearly report about the performance of graduating seniors for each school and district. Since the state of Nebraska requires that all 11th grade students take the ACT in the spring of their junior year, the graduating senior report includes nearly all graduating seniors in the district. This report includes the most recent ACT score for each student.

EPS graduates consistently score above both state and national averages on the ACT. For 2019 EPS graduates, the average composite score was 25.1, the highest in District history. Elkhorn High School and Elkhorn South High School continue to be the highest achieving compared to all other Class A and Class B Nebraska high schools.


Results featured illustrate how 2019 EPS graduates rank in comparison to state and national averages. Most notable is the nearly 5 point gap in EPS average composite scores compared to national average composites.



National Testing - MAP

The Measures of Academic Progress - Growth (MAP Growth) test is a nationally normed achievement test that is administered to all EPS students in grades 2-9. MAP Growth is an adaptive assessment that can be administered multiple times per year, allowing teachers and administrators to better measure academic growth.


Nationally, 25 percent of students fall in each of the four quartiles. In Elkhorn, nearly 85 percent of students score at or above national averages (50th percentile). The graphs illustrate the percent of Elkhorn students in each quartile on the Spring 2019 MAP reading and math assessments.



National Testing - 10th Grade Pre-ACT

All EPS 10th grade students take the Pre-ACT in the spring to provide students with information about their own preparation for the ACT. From their results, students are determined to be On Target, On the Cusp, or In Need of Intervention for a college-ready score on the ACT.

Below, EPS students are compared to a National Pilot Group from the most recent norming study available, showing EPS students ranking significantly above national "On Target" averages in all subject areas.



Graduation Requirements



In addition to core graduation requirements, EPS high schools offer a range of other courses and activities including career/technical education, world languages, physical education/health, visual performing arts, extracurricular activities and career-awareness experiences.

All students are encouraged to take a rigorous curriculum in order to maximize their options after high school. This includes four years of English; three or more years of math (with Algebra I, II, and Geometry as the minimum); three or more years of social science; and at least three years of natural science.

In order to graduate from an EPS high school, a student is required to accumulate 42 credits (210 semester hours) that must include 8 credits of English, 6 credits of social science (must include American History and Government), 6 credits of mathematics (must include Algebra I), 6 credits of science (must include Biology), 2 credits of physical education, 1 credit of Personal Finance and Careers, and 14 credits of electives.

Advanced Placement (AP) Offerings

EPS offers numerous, rigorous, college-level Advanced Placement (AP) courses where students may earn college credit upon successful completion of a National AP Exam.

EPS AP enrollment and the number of AP exams taken for college credit has steadily increased in the last five years. This shift is credited to the continual focus on AP course offerings and the culture of rigor at EPS high schools.



The EPS tax levy is determined by the district's general, bond, and building funds. The common general and common building fund levies are set by the Learning Community of Douglas and Sarpy counties.



EPS continually maintains one of the lowest per pupil costs in Nebraska, averaging \$10,011.55 compared to a state average of \$12,613.59.

Additionally, given the District's strong focus on student learning, more than 67% of the total budget goes directly into the instructional budget, compared to a state average of only 62.10%.
