OUR DISTRICT

Elkhorn Public Schools (EPS) is a rapidly growing suburban school district located on the west edge of the Omaha Metro area. Our enrollment continues to climb by more than six percent each year, and we continue to add facilities to accommodate our growing student population. The District offers the cultural, educational and retail advantage of the city, while still maintaining the qualities of a smaller community. We pride ourselves on the achievement of our students and the dedication of our staff.

EPS currently maintains 14 school buildings as well as a freestanding Early Education Center. In November 2011, Elkhorn voters approved a \$49.1 million bond issue to build two new elementary schools (Sagewood and West Bay—opened in 2013), as well as the District's fourth middle school (Elkhorn Grandview—opening fall 2014).

Our students consistently score well above state and national averages on standardized assessments. EPS maintains a culture of continuous improvement and continues to raise the bar for all students.

This Annual Report offers important and detailed information about the curriculum, demographics and assessment data from the Elkhorn Public School District during the 2012-13 school year.

OUR MISSION

Elkhorn Public Schools unites students, families, educators, and the community to ensure a challenging and enriching academic environment that inspires students to develop the knowledge and skills necessary to become responsible citizens and lifelong learners.

OUR COMMUNITY

Students and families in Elkhorn benefit from a strong sense of community support in and out of their neighborhood schools.

Our schools see high levels of parental involvement, with more than 98 percent of elementary parents attending semester Parent/Teacher conferences. Local business and individuals are also key to the success of our schools with support for the Elkhorn Public Schools Foundation and District programs such as Partners in Education Mentoring.

The Elkhorn community has passed nine bond issues since 1992 and has supported the addition of 10 new schools since 2000. Support from our community has been essential to accommodating the rapidly growing student population while maintaining our high standards for student achievement.


NeSA ASSESSMENTS

Each spring, students in grades three though eight as well as 11th grade take the Nebraska State Accountability assessments (NeSA) in writing, reading, math and most recently added in 2012, science. Elkhorn students showed high levels of mastery across grade levels and subject areas, scoring well above state averages.


On all NeSA assessments, students fall into one of three categories: Below Standards, Meets Standards or Exceeds Standards. The State is responsible for setting the *cut scores*, which determine how a student must score in order to fall in each of the three categories.

NeSA-Writing

Since its induction in 2006, Elkhorn students have shown very high levels of mastery on the NeSA-W. 2013 marked the first year fourth graders took the more rigorous, revised online assessment. Students in grades eight and 11 took the revised online assessment beginning in 2012.



91% of 11th graders mastered the State's Writing Test in 2013




96% of 4th graders mastered the State's Reading Test in 2013 NeSA-Reading

2012-13 marked the fourth year of the State Reading Assessment, NeSA-R. Elkhorn students again showed high levels of mastery with 90 to 98 percent of students meeting or exceeding the standards. Elementary students made gains at all tested grade levels for the second year in a row.


NeSA-Math

2013 marked the third year of the NeSA Math assessment. Elkhorn students maintained high levels of mastery especially at the higher grade levels.

Elkhorn's two high school were again among the top in the state for levels of mastery on the NeSA-M assessment. Eighty-eight percent of Elkhorn 11th graders mastered the test compared to an average of 58 percent statewide.

NeSA-Science

In 2013, students in grades 5, 8 and 11 took the State's science assessment. Elkhorn students were among the top in the metro area in level of mastery. Notably, 94 percent of Elkhorn eighth graders mastered the assessment compared to the state average of 69 percent.

STATE RANKING SYSTEMNePAS

The Nebraska Performance Accountability System (NePAS) is a ranking system of all school districts in the state created by the Nebraska Department of Education. Rankings reflect the total number of school districts in the state (249). It is important to note: as a district improves its status ranking, it will be more difficult to achieve high rankings in the area of growth as students near the achievement "ceiling." For example: a student who scores a perfect score one year will only be capable of a zero in growth the following year.

*Due technical issues experienced during the online writing assessment, the state did not rank writing in 2013.

Status rank is based on the average NeSA scale scores and represents the overall achievement level of the district.

Elkhorn was the only school district to be listed in the State's top 10 Status Rankings for two years in a row.

The State's ranking system also ranked the District in the following areas:


Improvement rank is based on the same grade-level from year to year and measures different groups of students.

Growth rank is based on the same group of students as they progress through the grade levels. Growth was only measured in the areas of reading and math for 2013.

Graduation rank is based on the "graduation cohort." The graduation cohort is assigned when a student enrolls as a ninth grader. Students must fulfill the high school graduation requirements within four years to graduate with their cohort.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS

ACT scores were at the highest in District history in 2013, with a District composite average of **24.0**

For the second year in a row, the **Elkhorn South** Girl's Golf and Boy's Tennis Teams earned **first place at State.** (2011 & 2012)

Elkhorn Valley View and **Elkhorn Ridge Middle Schools** placed first and second, respectively, in the 2013 Future Cities Regional competition.

Both EHS and ESHS were named to the *Washington Post's* list of America's Most Challenging High Schools in 2013.

EPS Students were involved in their community in 2012-2013. Students volunteered and made donations to several local and national non-profit organizations including a donation of more than \$65,000 to the American Heart Association.

81.6% of EPS High School students were involved in at least one activity during the 2012-13 school year.

High School Activities

The Elkhorn community takes great pride in the involvement of its students. More than 81 percent of EPS high school students participate in extracurricular activities. Studies show students who are involved tend to perform better in the classroom and hold higher grade point averages. Elkhorn's unprecedented decision to operate two smaller, Class B, high schools has encouraged more students to participate in athletics, clubs and other extracurriculars.

Students at both Elkhorn high schools can participate in a wide array of activities including: DECA, Debate Team, Drama Club, Color Guard, Dance Team, FBLA, FCCLA, E-Club, National Honor Society, Cheerleading, Student Council, Academic Decathlon, Mock Trial, Destination Imagination, Quiz Bowl, Foreign Language Club, Yearbook, Newspaper, Speech Team, Power Drive, Instrumental Music, S.A.D.D., Pep Club, Student Athletic Training, Intramurals, Football, Cross Country, Volleyball, Softball, Golf, Tennis, Wrestling, Track, Soccer, Swimming and Baseball.

Middle School Activities

All Elkhorn middle school students have the opportunity to participate in extracurricular activities including: Instrumental Music, Show Choir, Jazz Band, Chess Club, Computer Club, Science Club (select schools), Student Council, Yearbook, Drama Club, academic competitions (Math Counts, History Day, Future Cities Competition, Destination Imagination) Running Club, Football*, Volleyball*, Basketball*, Wrestling* and Track*. *Middle school sports are sanctioned by the Nebraska Schools Activities Association and therefore are offered for students in grades 7 and 8.

Elementary Activities

Elkhorn elementary school students have the opportunity to participate in school activities including: Reading Club, Girls on the Run, Walking Club, Writing Club, Student Council, Battle of the Books, DestiNation Imagination, Safety Patrol and Drama Club.


NATIONAL TESTING

Stanford 10


Elkhorn Students in grades three through nine took the Stanford 10 (SAT 10) Achievement test in April. The comprehensive standardized achievement test allows parents and teachers to measure student progress against a nationally representative sample of students at the same grade level.

Stanford 10 information is shared with parents and also used by teachers to identify curriculum strengths and weaknesses. Results in the following graphs indicate the percent of students in the national norm group who scored lower than Elkhorn students. For example, a percentile rank of 87 indicates that Elkhorn students, as a group, scored higher than 87 percent of their peers in the national sample. Elkhorn students consistently score well above the 50th percentile national average. The gold line marks the 50th percentile on the SAT 10 Math and Reading graphs below.





SAT 10 Reading




As a group, Elkhorn students out-scored 77 to 87 percent of their peers on the SAT 10 Math and Reading Tests.



PLAN Test


The PLAN test is given annually to all Elkhorn 10th grade students. This test is developed by the American College Testing Service (ACT) and is used to gather a variety of information, including: educational plans, career interests, predicted ACT scores and academic need areas. Elkhorn students as a group have consistently performed above national averages on this assessment.



ACT

The ACT measures the skills and higher order thinking necessary to be successful in college. In 2013, the overall average composite score for Elkhorn seniors was 24, the highest in District history.

As a group, Elkhorn students consistently score above both the State and National averages. Also notable, is that more than 90 percent of 2013 Elkhorn graduates took the ACT Test.



COURSES, CREDITS & INSTRUCTIONAL TIME

Graduation Requirements

In order to graduate from an Elkhorn high school, a student is required to accumulate 42 credits (210 semester hours) that must include the following:

- 8 Credits of English
- 6 Credits of Social Science

(must include American History and Government)

- 6 Credits of Mathematics (Must include Algebra 1)
- 6* Credits of Science (Must include Biology)
- 2 Credits of Physical Education
- 1 Credit of Technology
 - (Career Information Technology Course)
- 14 Credits of Electives

Students planning to attend a four-year college or university after graduation are encouraged to take the recommended ACT CORE CURRICULUM, which includes four years of English; three or more years of Math (with Algebra I, II and geometry as the minimum); three or more years of social science; and at least three years of natural science. *Beginning with the graduating class of 2015, students must complete six hours of science credits.

High School Course Offerings

Elkhorn high schools offer a total of 689 instructional units (state minimum is 400) in the subject ares of Language Arts, Social Sciences, Mathematics, Science, World Language, Career/Technical Education, Physical Education/Health and Visual Performing Arts.

Advanced Placement Courses

Elkhorn high schools offer rigorous, college-level Advanced Placement courses in English Literature and Composition, English Language and Composition, Calculus (AB and BC), Chemistry, Spanish, Statistics, Biology, U.S. History, World History and European History. Students may earn college credit in any of these classes upon successful completion of a National Advanced Placement Exam in May.

Student Assistance Program


