Students and families in Elkhorn benefit from a strong sense of community both inside and outside of their neighborhood schools. Our schools see high levels of parental involvement, with an average Parent/Teacher Conference attendance of nearly 90% district-wide. "My school is adequately preparing my student for the next level of learning."



Student and Staff Demographics


In 2020-2021, Elkhorn Public Schools experienced a nearly 4% student enrollment increase, welcoming almost 400 new students into its buildings. To assist with this continued growth, the District opened the doors to two new school buildings, Woodbrook Elementary and Elkhorn North High School. Both schools reside on the north side of EPS boundaries, an area that continues to see high rates of residential growth contributing to increases in student enrollment occurring at a rate faster than initially projected.




10th Grade Pre-ACT

All EPS sophomore students take the Pre-ACT in the spring to provide students with information about their own preparation for the ACT. From their results, students are determined to be On Target, On the Cusp, or In Need of Intervention for a college-ready score on the ACT.




11th Grade ACT

In order to meet state and federal testing requirements, students are required to take the ACT in the spring of their junior year. This requirement gives all students an opportunity to take the ACT at no cost to them and to then use the results earned for college entrance information. The graph features EPS student scores, both composite and in individual subject areas, in comparison to Nebraska state averages. Notably, not all students participated in the test in 2021. A very large percentage of EPS students were included, but participation varied across the state.



Graduate ACT


EPS graduates consistently score above both state and national averages on the ACT. For 2021 EPS graduates, the average composite score was 23.8. Results featured illustrate how 2021 EPS graduates rank in comparison to state and national averages. As with the 11th grade ACT, participation levels varied across the state.



State Testing: NSCAS

Annually, students in grades 3-8 take the Nebraska Student-Centered Assessment System (NSCAS) assessments in English Language Arts (ELA) and Math. On all NSCAS assessments, students fall into one of three state-determined categories: Developing, On Track, and College and Career Ready.


The graphs show the percentage of EPS students meeting or exceeding state standards compared to state averages.




National Testing: MAP Growth

The Measures of Academic Progress (MAP) Growth test is a nationally normed achievement test that is administered to all EPS students in grades K-9. MAP Growth is an adaptive assessment that can be administered multiple times per year, allowing teachers and administrators to better measure academic growth during the school year.

Nationally, 25 percent of students fall in each of the four quartiles. In Elkhorn, over 80 percent of students score at or above national averages. The graphs illustrate the percentage of EPS students in each quartile on the Spring 2021 MAP Growth reading and math






Advanced Placement (AP

EPS offers numerous, rigorous, college-level Advanced Placement (AP) courses where students may earn college credit upon successful completion of a National AP Exam. AP enrollment and the number of AP exams taken for college credit has steadily increased in the last four years. This shift is credited to the continual focus on AP course offerings and the culture of rigor at EPS high schools.

Graduation Requirements and Report

EPS students are encouraged to take a rigorous curriculum in order to maximize their post-secondary options. To graduate from an EPS high school, students must accumulate 42 credits to include 8 English credits, 6 credits of social sciences (must include American History and Government), 6 math credits (must include Algebra I), 6 credits of science (must include Biology), 2 credits of physical education, 1 personal finance and careers credit, and 14 elective credits.



EPS continually maintains one of the lowest per pupil costs in Nebraska, averaging only \$11,335 per pupil. Additionally, given the District's strong focus on student learning, more than 65% of the total budget goes directly into the instructional budget.
