### NEBRASKA STUDENT - CENTERED ASSESSMENT SYSTEM (NSCAS)

The Nebraska State Accountability (NeSA) tests are no longer being administered. They are being replaced with the newly developed Nebraska Student - Centered Assessment System (NSCAS). Students in grades 6-8 will all take the Reading and Math tests. Eighth grade students only will take the Science test. The testing window is March 19th thru May 4th. We have not set testing dates, but will let you know as soon as that schedule is made.

### 6th Grade News

Mr. Ebers, Mrs. Finks, Mrs. Mitteis Ms. Niebaum, Mrs. Ottens, Mr. Phelps, Mrs. Randall, and Ms. Stromgren

#### MATH - Ms. Niebaum

Students are using integers, absolute value, and graphing on the coordinate plane to solve real-world problems. We investigated another strategy to help us solve problems called the work backward strategy. This will help us when we are doing algebra and solving equations. We will review powers, exponents, properties, and the order of operations before we start simplifying expressions. The students will be working on writing expressions before we begin evaluating and solving equations. Geometry is our next emphasis of study. In February, we will have the opportunity to work on math skills while helping others by participating in the St. Jude Children's Hospital Math - a - thon. Look for information about this activity to come home with your student. Credit will be given for working math problems from the Math - a thon booklets and students will not only achieve academically but work on citizenship skills. A student can still receive credit even if they do not want to participate in the fund raising part.

### PRE - CONCEPTS - Ms. Niebaum and Mrs. Ottens

Students are focusing on solving expressions and equations. We reviewed the properties of operations to help write and solve expressions. Students will evaluate algebraic expressions when given the value for the variables and simplify expressions by combining like terms. Next, we will solve one and two-step equations. Gear up for geometry; it's next! In February, we will have the opportunity to work on math skills while helping others by participating in the St. Jude Children's Hospital Math - a - thon. Look for information about this activity to come home with your student. Credit will be given for working math problems from the Math – a – thon booklets and students will not only achieve academically but work on citizenship skills. A student can still receive credit even if they do not want to participate in the fund raising part.

### LANGUAGE ARTS - Mrs. Randall and Ms. Stromgren

Language arts students will be completing their author research projects. The new semester brings a new routine. In place of spelling tests, students will be taking weekly grammar tests. The students are given grammar topics to study at the beginning of the week. Each day, there are activities to practices those skills. Websites like <a href="mailto:quizizz.com">quizizz.com</a> offer great opportunities to practice as well. After author research, students will be working on essay organization in preparation for the district writing assessment that will take place the week of February 19th. Continue to visit teacher's websites for updates, homework, and additional copies of notes and assignments. ### **READING - Ms. Stromgren and Mrs. Finks**

During the month of February, students will read a biography chapter book, then complete a project that focuses on characteristics of nonfiction text. Students will also be reading a variety of nonfiction texts and studying Greek and Latin roots. Third quarter AR goals are due on March 5TH.

### SOCIAL STUDIES - Mr. Ebers and Mrs. Randall

In February, 6th grade Social Studies students will take part in activities relating to the government and banking. Also, students will learn about how the government is financed and how international trade works with other countries. Just a reminder to be collecting any pictures, postcards, souvenirs, etc. from your Travelmate for the end of the year Travelmate project in May.

### SCIENCE - Mr. Phelps and Mrs. Mitteis

We hope all those who attended the Australian Reef video conference enjoyed the experience! We have heard nothing but good things from those who attended. By the time you get this newsletter students will have participated in two video conferences with the International Wolf Center located in Ely, Minnesota and the Henry Doorly Zoo.. Special thanks goes to the Elkhorn Foundation for funding these conferences.

We will begin our classification unit after taking the two district tests on life sciences. Don't be surprised if your child is emptying out their drawers at home and organizing them for practice. All living organisms have been organized by scientists and students will be learning why this is important. Hopefully this skill will carry over to everyday life!



### 7th Grade News

#### SCIENCE - Mr. Breitkreutz and Mrs. Mitteis

During the end of January, students wrapped up the human body system unit. Included topics of circulatory, endocrine, lymphatic, and nervous system. In February, students will be exploring the concepts of speed, velocity and motion. They will study Newton's Laws of Motion through lab experiments and applied math.

### LANGUAGE ARTS - Mrs. Nelson and Ms. Pawoll

In February, students will research, write, and present persuasive speeches on "Inventions that have improved the quality of life". Students continue working on writing, parts of speech, quizzing with grammar minutes, and proofreading skills. Please encourage your child to practice his/her flash cards on grammar and quiz on the quia site.

### **READING - Mrs. Nelson and Mrs. Bradford**

Seventh grade reading students have been studying a variety of categories of idioms. We have also been focusing on non-fiction text structures and features that will help to improve comprehension. We will continue our study of non-fiction and then move into figurative language study next. AR continues with the goal period ending Monday, March 12. Vocabulary quizzes continue as well as we move into a new book which focuses on academic vocabulary. Friday, February 2 will be "Dress Like An Idiom" Day in 7th grade.

### **WORLD HISTORY - Mrs. Bryan and Mr. Breitkreutz**

Students will spend the first part of February exploring the later Middle Ages in Europe. We will be creating a 2D or 3D visual representation project focused on a topic related to the Middle Ages. We look forward to seeing the wide variety of topics, materials and outcomes this project will generate! We will then begin our examination of the Renaissance, the Reformation, Exploration, Enlightenment & Revolution.

### HEALTH / HUMAN GROWTH & DEVELOPMENT - Mrs. Fletcher

The following information pertains to 7<sup>th</sup> grade Health. All 7th graders will be taking Health class during 5th or 6th rotation this year **beginning February 19**. The 7th grade Health class focuses on aspects of human growth and development and family life education. Topics of study include: making healthy choices, self-respect, respect for others, puberty and adolescence, body image, responsible relationships, relationship skills, marriage and parenthood, human reproduction, pregnancy, prenatal development and child birth, dating, abstinence, teen pregnancy, sexual harassment, sexual abuse, and sexually transmitted diseases.

Parents (or guardians) are asked to be involved in this class by discussing four different take-home assignments with their child.

These assignments are:

 Adolescence, 2) Dating, 3) Your Child's Arrival, 4) Your Family Beliefs & Values

Parents are welcome to ask questions and discuss any part of the cur-

riculum with the teacher. Parents are also invited to check out a copy of the textbook and to preview any worksheets, videos, or other materials that are used during class.

### PRE - ALGEBRA - Mrs. Ottens and Mrs. Klein

Students in Pre-Algebra have been working on our geometry unit. They should be able to explain how the Pythagorean Theorem works and how to find angle measures of triangles using algebra. We will spend some time on transformations, followed by volume. Over the next couple months we will be spending some days reviewing topics for the new state math test. This test is a great way for the students to show how much they have learned in the past year! If your student wants to brush up on topics, please have them spend extra time at home working on the Learning Path on ALEKS.

#### MATH - Mrs. Klein

Students in Math 7 have been working on our unit on simplifying algebraic expressions. This helps give them some of the algebra basics for solving equations in the future. Next we will work on learning how to solve one-step equations and then 2-step equations. Over the next couple months we will be spending some days reviewing topics for the new state math test. This test is a great way for the students to show how much they have learned in the past year! If your student wants to brush up on topics, or seems to be struggling with math, please have them spend extra time at home working on the Learning Path on ALEKS; 15-20 minutes per day can go a long way in helping understanding!



### 8th Grade News

### LANGUAGE ARTS - Mr. Barry and Ms. Pawoll

Students have just started on a very long District Common Assessment. This assessment will challenge students on the following skills: research, essay writing, and public speaking. All three of these skills have been taught and practiced prior to this assessment. Each student has received a calendar that contains due dates for particular items. The nice thing about this project is that students should not have homework if they are working hard in class and meeting the check points in order to not fall behind on the project.

#### SCIENCE - Mrs. Kammerer and Mr. Breitkreutz

The month of January was spent studying cell parts and processes (photosynthesis, respiration, diffusion, and osmosis). Students learned about organelles of cells and their functions as well as how a cell exchanges food, waste and gasses necessary for survival. They also learned about microscopes and how scientists use them to observe the single-celled world. We ended January discovering how cells reproduce in processes called mitosis and meiosis. In February, we will focus on DNA and genetics. Students will learn about the structure of DNA, how traits are inherited, how to construct a Punnett square to determine probability of inheritance, and genetic mutations and disorders. There will be a district common assessment over cell reproduction and heredity near the end of the month.

### PRE-ALGEBRA and ALGEBRA - Mrs. Semin and Mrs. Ottens

Pre-Algebra students are exploring line and angle relationships as well as the Pythagorean Theorem. Students will be working with transformations which include rotations, reflections, translations, and dilations over the next few weeks. We will wrap up our Geometry unit by working with finding the volume of cones, spheres, and cylinders.

#### ALGEBRA - Mrs. Semin

Algebra students recently completed a District Common Assessment on simplifying powers and exponents, and next will be studying rational exponents and exponential equations. In addition, Algebra students took the Geometry Readiness Test which helps to determine math placement in high school. Please contact me if you have any questions regarding high school math placement.

### READING - Ms. Christie and Ms. Stromgren

In February, we will be wrapping up the NONFICTION UNIT and taking a DCA over Comprehension and Analysis of Nonfiction on February 8. Following that unit, we will be covering a unit on Figurative Language

and Literary Devices, with an emphasis on poetry. Finally, students will be making progress on their 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter AR goals that will be due March 9. Students are required to read one nonfiction AR book this quarter and submit a reflection sheet on that book as well.



#### H.A.L.E. - Mrs. Cohen

Quiz Bowl is up and running again and the next competition is right around the corner. This time the kids in 6th, 7th, and 8th grade attend the tournament organized by Gretna. Five teams will be participating! Good luck! With the new year there are new opportunities in HALE such as 6<sup>th</sup> grade author study projects, 7th grade medieval times projects, and 8th graders will be attending a Cybersurgery simulation. The HALE kids are busy. To round out February, a group of students will be participating in a Vex Robotics seminar in Lincoln, several will attend a seminar at the Henry Doorly Zoo working closely with several of the zookeepers in the Hoofstock and Elephant areas, and all grades are participating in the Stock Market Game. Two teams of students will be attending the Science Bowl and any interested students participated in the History Bee. Congratulations to Enzo Pollino for winning the school Geography Bee!

### AMERICAN HISTORY - Mrs. Hultman and Mrs. Semin

This month, we begin studying the differences between the North and South, and then we will begin looking at the causes and progression of the Civil War. This will include what led up to actual fighting, people involved, battles, consequences, etc... As always, if you have questions or concerns, please do not hesitate to e-mail or call!

### 8th GRADE SPANISH - Ms. Garrison and Mrs. Espinoza

This group of students is currently studying family descriptions with restaurant vocabulary and gustar-like verbs with indirect object pronouns. As the amount of vocabulary and grammar increases, we ask that you remind your student to take 10 -15 minutes a night to review notes and study vocab. Also, your student should be memorizing and or studying their important questions weekly, as this will help them improve their speaking skills. A great study habit would be to ask your student a few of these questions each night or have him/her teach them to you. Also they are writing a restaurant scene skit that they will be presenting from memory starting February 7th. We will then be starting a unit called "Viva el Verbo" which covers irregular verbs.

### 7th GRADE SPANISH - Ms. Garrison and Mrs. Espinoza

Students are finishing a chapter which focuses on the verb estar and expression the location of classroom objects using prepositions. As the amount of vocabulary and grammar increases, I ask that you remind your student to take 10 -15 minutes a night to review notes and study vocab. Also, your student should be memorizing and or studying their important questions weekly, as this will help them improve their speaking skills. A great study habit would be to ask your student a few of these questions each night or have him/her teach them to you. It would also be helpful for them to study their subject pronouns and ar verb conjugations as our next chapter will focus on er and ir verb conjugation.

### 6th GRADE LANGUAGE EXPERIENCE - Ms. Garrison and Mrs. Espinoza

¡Bienvenidos a la clase de español! Students have been researching countries in Central and South America as well as reviewing numbers, greetings, and the alphabet. Since this semester is the first chapter of the high school Spanish One curriculum, students need to spend at least 10 – 15 minutes a night practicing spelling and pronunciation of their vocab and notes. Also, if your student is absent, please remind them to come see Ms. Garrison or Mrs. Espinoza in the morning, the day they return to school.



### PARENTS OF CURRENT 7TH AND 8TH GRADE STUDENTS

In recent years we have heard from parents that students are spending more and more time at home doing school work with their family computers. As part of the EPS 5-Year Instructional Technology Plan approved by the school board in October 2016, next year's 8th grade students (current 7th grade students) will receive an individual Chromebook for educational use next fall. In addition, all high school students will also be receiving a Chromebook next fall. Therefore, current 8th grade students will receive an individual Chromebook for educational use when they transition to 9th grade. Please note, current 8th grade students will receive a different Chromebook than the one they used during the 17 -18 school year.



The district is finding that much of our educational content requires access to technology, and Chromebooks allow us a cost-effective way to assure that students have this access when it is needed. As part of this initiative, parents of 2018-19 eighth and ninth grade students are encouraged to attend an orientation either during Back to School 101 or Open House in August. The exact dates for these orientations are not yet set, but the district wanted to begin communication with parents of current 7th-11th grade students. We are very excited about providing a computing device for these students next school year.
