6th Grade News

SCIENCE - Mr. Phelps and Ms. Mitteis

Sixth Graders will finish the year by observing, exploring, and discussing weather. Concepts include the atmosphere, air pressure and winds, clouds and precipitation, air masses and air fronts, and how scientists predict weather. The unit will conclude with an activity that will test every skill students have learned. Students will be working as a team of meteorologists to use their knowledge of weather to track a major hurricane and issue watches and warnings just like NOAA does. This realistic simulation will be action packed!

LANGUAGE EXPERIENCE- Ms. Garrison and Mrs. Espinoza

Are you hearing any Spanish at your house? Students have recently been assessed on common questions and answers, numbers, time, body parts, calendar information, the weather, seasons and classroom objects. As we finish out the year, students will be creating and presenting news casts. There will be a final countries and capitals test. They will need to know how to locate the Spanish speaking countries and spell the countries and capitals from memory. They will also get to explore their first vocabulary list for 7th grade. They can study over the summer using their packets from this year and the online book at: Pearson Realize.

LANGUAGE ARTS—Mrs. Randall and Ms. Stromgren

Sixth grade students will begin the month reviewing for the Mechanics District Assessment. It has been very rewarding watching the continued improvements students are making learning concepts on the weekly grammar quizzes. Students will end the year writing poetry and writing a position paper about birth order. We appreciate the support at home throughout the year. Enjoy your summer!

SOCIAL STUDIES - Mr. Ebers and Mrs. Randall

In May, students will be finishing up their urban geography unit. Students have been exploring the growth of west Omaha, renovations done throughout the city, demographics, and the role the Chamber of Commerce plays to improve Omaha. Students will also take part in a mall project where they will get to choose their own stores in their mall. Students should be working on their end of the year Travelmate project as a letter was sent home in April. This Travelmate project will be due on Friday, May 11th. We look forward to hearing about where the Travelmates have visited this school year!

READING - Mrs. Finks and Ms. Stromgren

During the second week in May, students will be creating a paper bag character project based upon a character in a book they have independently read during 4th quarter. We will wrap up the year by reading folk tales and tall tales. The fourth quarter AR goal will end on May 11th. Continue reading this summer! Thanks for a great year!

MATH - Ms. Niebaum

Did you hear about the "average 6th grader"? Students collected data from answers to questions they asked their fellow 6th graders. The data was displayed in various graphs. From these graphs the students put the information on a cut-out of a person showing, in creative ways, the data they collected. The graphing unit had students solving problems using information presented in line plots, dot plots, box, plots, stem and leaf graphs and histograms. The measures of central tendency, mean, median, mode alone with range were found and interpreted for sets of data. Have a wonderful summer!

PRE CONCEPTS - Ms. Niebaum and Mrs. Ottens

We will finish out the year with geometry. We will be classifying angles and using protractors to do that. Students will also be able to determine the area and circumference of circles given radius or diameter. We will be using Pi to help us solve those problems. We have truly enjoyed working with this talented group of students. They have a wonderful way of thinking about math outside the "math box". Have a wonderful summer!



7th Grade News

SPANISH - Ms. Garrison and Mrs. Espinoza

This current unit is about eating healthy foods and exercising. The verb conjugations are getting a little harder, so remind your student to go to moodle or google classroom and practice the 3B activities. As the 7th graders finish out the year, they will create a poster about how to maintain one's health. They will also get to explore their first vocabulary list for 8th grade. WORLD HISTORY - Mrs. Bryan and Mr. Breitkreutz

In May, 7th grade World History students will complete the unit on World War II. We will complete the World War II DCA. We will then examine the Cold War and take a look at the location of major countries and geographical features of the world.

SCIENCE - Mr. Breitkreutz and Mrs. Mitteis

We are almost finished with our Astronomy unit. Students will choose a project after they complete the astronomy DCA. The remainder of the school year will be spent reviewing Scientific Method by conducting an egg drop experiment. Students are welcome to bring in supplies for the egg design. BETTER HEARING AND SPEECH MONTH

More than 5 million children in the United States have a speech, language, and hearing disorder. The American Speech-Language-Hearing Association (ASHA) celebrates May as Better Hearing and Speech Month (BHSM) to help provide awareness and information about communication disorders. Child speech and language problems include: stuttering, articulation problems ("wabbit" instead of "rabbit"), language disorders such as the slow development of vocabulary, concepts, and grammar, and voice disorders (nasal, breathy, or horse voice and speech that is too high or low). Hearing disorders can range from very mild hearing losses to more profound losses requiring hearing aides or even cochlear implants. By promoting Better Hearing and Speech Month, I hope parents and educators will learn more about communication disorders, what they can do to help their children, and how speechlanguage pathologists and audiologists can help with communication disorders.

Apps Parents Should Know—Apps that Encourage Outdoor Activity

With the end of the school year in sight, parents are beginning to think about new and exciting ways to keep students busy, without losing them to the constant temptation of mindless technology use. The following apps allow individuals to utilize their tech instruments, while also being recommended by Common Sense Media (www.commonsensemedia.org) for encouraging outdoor activities.

Plum's Photo Hunt: this free app, sponsored by PBS, is a great way to engage elementary-aged children and their parents in outdoor activity. Users are given a list of objects and observations that can be found in nature of which to take photos. Finding things like signs of animal life, tiny things in nature, and patterns found in nature gives children a sense of adventure while learning new exploratory skills and improving their observation skills.

Geocaching: Geocaching is a great family activity that inspires outdoor activity in conjunction with family time. The app gives users a list of GPS locations where others have stashed hidden treasures, and provides hints and directions on locating it. While geocaching is a great family activity, it is suggested that users always have adult supervision and is not recommended for individual use by children.

Be Open to Addressing Alcohol Abuse

Addressing it is difficult—and avoiding the discussion is even more difficult. Just thinking about having to confront or address the issue can send chills up one's spine. If you look at the subject as recognizing and reversing a disease, it could be easier to approach. Those who have a tendency to abuse alcohol cross all races, creeds, ages, and economic brackets. Below are ideas to help you approach the topic with family and friends:

Children and pre-teens—Yes, in some instances, use begins before and during middle school years. Keep discussions focused on the present. Ask open-ended questions about how they were introduced to drugs/alcohol. Calmly stress your expectations. Be gentle and firm, and above all, try not to condemn.

Teens—Teen years are rocky. Although teens are often very cognizant of right and wrong when it comes to alcohol use, peer pressure is paramount. At this period of their lives, they are breaking away from "family ties" and are creating their own social groups. If teens are associating with other teens who are drinking, it is highly likely that they, too, will test the waters. Teens know that you want them to remain abstinent, and you are concerned about legal ramifications. Make time for them regularly, and provide a safe space by listening to what they have to say.

Young Adults—If you begin to see signs that they are drinking to excess, try gently confronting them. Let them know you realize they may feel you are being overly protective, or even meddling, but express firmly that you are genuinely concerned. Ask directly if they are experiencing a lot of excessive drinking among college classmates and/or those with whom they are working. If they are in a new town, encourage them to share with you who their friends are, and what kinds of things they enjoy doing together. DO NOT condemn their

actions, but ask open-ended questions that give insight into what they are facing. Remind them that you are available to talk with them, and furthermore, that you will be in their corner when it comes to seeking help.

Family Members, Friends, and Coworkers—These are the individuals with whom you will likely be having your longest ongoing relationship. Wait for a clear-headed opportunity. Ensure that you are clear-headed as well. Formulate what you are going to say, and rehearse voice modulation and choice of words with a neutral friend. Accusations fuel fire, and you are not looking to start arguments. Be specific when you talk with them. Bring up specific behaviors such as, "Remember that cook-out two weeks ago. I noticed that after a time you began drinking—almost without stopping. I am concerned because I also noticed you became angry toward others. I am not saying this to hurt you or criticize you; I only feel a deep concern for you. If you would like help, I could get you in touch with professionals."

Elderly—This is probably one of the most difficult areas to address. It is easy to overlook health care concerns of the elderly, possibly because drinking has always been a part of the life for the individual. It is not easily recognized by family, friends, and even professionals that it is getting worse. It is possible that drinking can put the individuals at huge risks for falls, dehydration, and other ailments that befall the elderly. Loneliness is often a trigger for their drinking. Perhaps you can suggest getting together. Take the older person out to enjoy the weather, and have lots of water on hand to avoid any dehydration. By Mary Clare Sheridan

De-Clutter to Address Your Mental Health Needs

General clutter is inevitable, and it is sometimes overwhelming to control. It is recognized that if you do not address this phenomenon, it can throw you into anxiety, depression, and even addiction. If you begin a program early to curtail the clutter growth, you can reduce your own anxiety, depression, and/or addiction, or you can actually prevent it from developing in the first place.

How does it affect your mental health? Your anxiety can easily increase when you observe the disarray before you. How do you effectively de-clutter? Anxiety is often exhibited as being unable to approach a situation because it appears to be beyond your ability of see that it can be reversed. Depression can easily follow the anxiety because you see "no end," and it appears to be only getting more forbidding. Addiction can take over easily—not necessarily with alcohol or drugs but with such things as a) not getting up and setting a routine; b) by resorting to the electronics—TV, internet, etc.; c) shopping or gambling to excess. You are in charge, and it is never too late to make changes.

- 1. Begin by accepting that the clutter is there. Perhaps enlist a friend or family member to give you a hand in restructuring the whole project. Together you can determine what you are going to address first, how long you will commit to that particular task, and the steps to take toward completion.
- 2. Set a goal for completing tasks. If your energy level is high in the morning, do it then; however, if you are a person who is not ready to "meet the world" until later in the day, set your time for later. Give yourself adequate time to complete the tasks, but avoid working until you are exhausted, so you aren't tempted to abandon your goals.
- 3. When you have completed the de-cluttering, celebrate. You and your helpers deserve it. Fix a special meal or go out to someplace special. You have earned it.
- 4. Finally, set new goals. Make each day a time to sort and de-clutter one small area, so you will not find yourself in the same situation again. What a beautiful and exhilarating way to start the spring season. If you concentrate throughout the year, you will be able to celebrate each upcoming season with doing something special because you put that de-cluttering behind you.

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
